

A Message from the Council President

Historically, Church of the Apostles and Homestead Village have been an alcohol-free campus. Homestead Village has moved away from that and now allows beer and wine to be served at different events.

I see an opportunity for COA, if we allow beer and wine at certain events, to expose our church and wonderful campus to other potential future members. Our two daughters were married on our church campus, but had to go elsewhere for their receptions. One of the receptions was held at Millersville University, which is alcohol free except for special events like wedding receptions.

As young couples are looking for affordable wedding venues, I see Apostles being able to help fill that need and expose them to our church. This might be the first time that some of these people have set foot in a church environment. When they have children, our church would be the most familiar for them to join and be part of a church community. The problem is that most couples want beer and wine at their wedding reception, which knocks Apostles out of the running.

I would like to hear feedback from everyone on this subject. My thinking is that there would be no need for volunteers, but it would be self-sufficient, generate an

income for the church, and expose our church to new people. The model would be like what Millersville University requires, as in insurance, a licensed bartender, and well-defined guidelines.

So please let me know what your thoughts are on this subject, the wedding season is coming up quickly.

Devotions in March – Bob Reiff

The **minutes** were approved by Bob/Cathy.

Treasury report: Annual report shows that the church is in a solid place financially. About 5% of the endowment was spent. There is a need for new members on the Stewardship Commission.

Education: Thanks went to Christa for taking the lead on the Education Commission. Carol Nielsen was listed as being on the Adult Education Committee. She has volunteered to co-teach a specific short-term class, but not to be on the committee.

Outreach: Carol, with the help of Cathy, explained the LancasterStandsUp group. She also talked about the Glass house which gives shelter to ex-prisoners.

Parish Life: They will accept the portion of earnings from the Bazaar that Worship will not use for prison ministry this year.

Worship: A new sound speaker was tried in the Sanctuary. It was very effective. There is an extra baptismal font stored in the youth center. It could be used by another church. A picture could be sent to the Penn Central Office to be shown on their website.

Pastor Kuhn's report: She will be attending a clergy conference on worship. She is leading a Good Friday jazz service. The conference is at the Double Tree at Willow Valley.

The 2017 General Synod for the UCC is being held in Baltimore. There will be an effort to provide busing for members who want to attend the Sunday afternoon service in Baltimore and also possible computer streaming for people to see doing our church service.

Heather's report:

The youth are reading the book *Almost Christian* by Kenda Creasy Dean. Ms. Dean is speaking at Highland Presbyterian Church Feb. 23rd.

Krista Tippett from the NPR program "On Being" is speaking March 4th at the Mennonite High School. Her book is part of the ticket price. Both speakers are sponsored by PRC.

Heather is preparing for Vacation Bible School. A suggestion is that it be called camp and not school. She belongs to a "Ministry and Mission" group which is part of the Lancaster Association.

Two communication resolutions discussed at executive meeting were presented and voted on- Cathy/ Bob:

1. Any communication to members of the congregation should be approved by one or both of the pastors.
2. Any external (outside the church members) communication needs to be approved by the senior pastor and the council president.

Alcohol Policy: The current policy was discussed and the downside of changing it so that weddings and some other events could serve alcohol. Changing the policy means it needs to go to a congregational meeting. Our insurance representative should be contacted to see what is required. Andy will contact the representative. Liability insurance is handled by property.



Wishing Well

We are having our Pajama Party in the Wishing Well until the end of May to collect children's pajamas in memory of Conner Holland. Conner Holland was a little boy from Lititz who, at the age of five, lost his battle with cancer several years ago. During his chemo treatments, he expressed his wish that every child undergoing cancer treatments should have cozy pajamas to wear. The

Holland family began Conner's Comfy PJs, a collection of pajamas for children in local oncology units of hospitals. They are asking for pajamas for boys and girls ages 12 months to 18 years. They especially need pajamas for the teens. Please consider participating in Conner's Comfy PJs by purchasing jammies and putting them in the Wishing Well. They need to be collected by May 24th. Information is posted on two posters: one above the Wishing Well and one on the Outreach bulletin board in the Narthex. Thank you for helping children who need a boost of love and comfort during their illness.

Missionary Support This Month

This year, for the second time, we will support CEVER (The Center for Evangelical and Reformed) Vocational Education. This is a school in Yoro, Honduras with courses ranging from auto mechanics to culinary arts. A new program this year will educate students for two years with the understanding that they become a teacher of their selected trade. There is a high unemployment rate in Honduras, yet CEVER finds it difficult to find qualified teachers for technical positions and industries. Twenty-five students who are interested in being teachers will have the opportunity to study for two years in this program.

CEVER is located in a rural area and many students travel up to an hour each way by foot or bus to attend classes. Since students are poor, many drop out of school to support their family. The school is trying to raise funds to provide financial assistance for up to half of the cost of the program for students studying to become certified teachers in technical trades.

Founded in 1877 by the Evangelical and Reformed Church of Honduras, CEVER now has 175 students enrolled ranging in age from 13 to 30; and there is room for 65 more students. The fees range from \$25 for a one-month scholarship to \$600 for a scholarship for one student's entire study of the program.

Outreach believes that this is a very rewarding, important mission in a country that is beset by crime and drugs in the urban areas. It is important that young people are educated and trained for jobs.

The Evangelical and Reformed Church (now part of the UCC) has a long history of helping Honduras. It is well worth it for us to continue.

Outreach Continued

Serve the Poor (In Person or Remotely)

Did you know it only costs approximately \$1.25 for us to serve breakfast downtown to a needy person? How can we even afford to do that when there is well over a hundred people attending? It is because about 20 or more people in church buy their grocery cards each month from us. Weis, Stauffers, and Giant give non-profits a 5% discount on cards. It doesn't cost you any more for you to shop, but the discount goes to the Outreach breakfast project. If you haven't tried it, see us in the office after church during the first three Sundays of the month.

Not only that, but you have the opportunity to actually serve the meals. If you and/or your family would like to try a new project, please see or call Julie Berkow at (717) 394-8233.




New Beginnings


Dear Friends,



Easter Memorial Flowers








