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Summer is here, and many of us are considering our vacation plans. Recognizing that “time away” is important, I wish to offer that you consider a time of Sabbath as part of your life. Sabbath is “when commerce halts, feasts are served, and all God’s children play.”¹

The idea of Sabbath is rooted in our scriptures, beginning with creation when God rested on the “seventh day” and named it holy. This is considered to be a time when God simply enjoyed creation and viewed it as good – a time to simply be with it, without needing to improve upon or create any further. In the stories of the Exodus, the people experienced keeping Sabbath as God gave manna for six days, and on the sixth they were to gather enough for two days, thus resting on the seventh. If they had taken more than they needed on other days, it spoiled overnight; but this was not the case on the sixth day. Then they received the commandment to “Remember the Sabbath day, and keep it holy.” (Exodus 20:8, NRSV) This commandment also states that honoring God, being grateful for what God has done for you, is an important part of the Sabbath.

So, what might Sabbath look like for you? Here are my suggestions for your consideration:

- Unplug for a day — Choose to spend a day without the use of the internet, TV, radio, or video. Instead use it as a day to talk or visit with family and friends, have shared meals, or play board or card games.
- Take away time pieces — For one day, take off your watch and/or put your phone where you may hear it, but not easily check it as a time piece. Turn off all the alarms and tuck away the calendars. Try living in the rhythm of creation – rising with the sun and reclining with its setting.
- Rest from commerce — Plan to not sell or buy anything for one day. Don’t even make a list for the next day! Instead, take a walk or a nap. Take time to sit in nature and appreciate the gifts of God which are free – a sunrise or sunset, the wild plants of a forest or field, the birds, fish, or other creatures which share our world.

Have fun with this! It is not intended to be one more thing for your “to-do” list. Instead, let’s just appreciate and give God our thanks for all that has been and is being provided for us, without our help!

Graduation...or Commencement?

Many members of Church of the Apostles have had the joy of a loved one finish a level of education in the past two months. The formal invitation arrives, and the list of "things to be done" is put [in my case] on paper: appropriate card, the "hoped for" enclosure, the RSVP after you weigh the value of being present in what is sometimes not a comfortable venue vs. showing up at the family graduation party where things are more "casual"...

So was the event a "graduation" or a "commencement"? Maybe the question is one of perspective. Looking up those terms in my [paperbound] dictionary, I found some interesting "shades" of each word. "Graduation, graduate, graduated" all have a nexus to some type of measurement: a graduated measuring cup, for example. But the closest "definition" of the PERSON involved in this process has an interesting perspective: "graduate: [noun and/or verb?] means to pass from one stage of experience or proficiency to a higher one".

But "commencement" is a more focused term: "to enter upon, or to make a beginning". Short and sweet, or IS it that simple?

The graduate has, by passing the required levels of education, gained more experience and proficiency toward the educational goal that results in...commencement! That may mean beginning to work on the increasing levels of experience and proficiency — again!

So, when does it end? Should it end?

Graduation and commencement are intertwined goals we should have; every day we can gain experience that then may be the impetus to try/begin something new [commence?]. As we continue to look forward in our lives, commencing new experiences can certainly lead to the next level of success and satisfaction.

So as our search for the Associate Pastor continues to "pass from one stage of experience...to a higher one," we are preparing for our...commencement..."make a beginning". So be it.

Giving Report for May 2015

The month of May ended with a deficit of \$20,446.84. Our combined income numbers totaled \$184,985.78 compared with our combined expenses of \$205,432.62. The monthly numbers give us a gauge of where we are, but there are always certain budgeted items that fall more during one period of the year than another. Such is the case with this month's report. While the budget shows that \$15,000 should have been received by now from the interest income on our investments, in reality, that money is still sitting in our investment account earning more interest. As is true of so many things, timing is everything.

In comparison, last year our income was \$193,454.95 and our expenses were almost identical to this year: \$205,550.48; so our deficit was smaller, or \$12,095.53.



Stewardship has begun the budgeting process for 2016 by giving the commissions the information they need to build each of the commission budgets. At our July Meeting, we will see the first pass of our expected expenses for next year. If you have interest in how the process works, please feel free to join us on July 16 in room 304 at 7 p.m. Everyone is always welcome.

Seeds of Hope



Seeds of Hope Garden June 2015

Summers really fly by! It's almost July and so much has been happening in the garden! We made it through the "almost drought" in the beginning of the season. The rain came finally, and the weeds just took off! Our harvest is slow because everything was planted late, but we're now just on the verge of being inundated with vegetables.

Our first harvest is always lettuce and a few spring onions. This week, we will begin picking those wonderful garden peas. Peas are so good straight out of the garden that many get eaten as they're being picked. Beets have been thinned in order to provide some "greens eaters" their yearly sautéed beet greens. A few small peppers have been picked, but we're going to let them grow a little longer to get bigger.

Stop down and see our beautiful new raised beds. We planted a double row of carrots in some of them and some beets in some others. The remaining ones have some sweet potatoes and also some zinnias planted in them. We're very pleased with how the beds turned out.

We can't wait for the potato harvest this year so we can stop fighting the Colorado Potato Beetle. Unfortunately, the beetles usually win the fight, but the last Sunday in May brought the Sunday School classes to the garden to help us. The children hunted potato bugs and got paid for every bug they picked off the plants. They now get to decide what church project will benefit from their labor.

We have some very good news to share: our corn crop looks like it will be phenomenal. So get ready sometime in August for the treat of the summer. Last year's corn was a bust, but the year before that we had some of the best corn around, and we're growing the same variety this year.

This concludes the update for this month. When it rains, everything grows. We just exist to clear a path in the weeds to give the crops room to grow. Look for our bounty under the portico this summer on Sunday mornings. Thank you for your generosity in the past, and thank you for continuing to support the Seeds of Hope Garden so that we can help feed the hungry in our area.

DEVOTIONS were provided by Andy Appel on the topics Serving Others and Meditation.

APPROVAL OF MARCH 16th MINUTES - After a motion by Don Freeman and a second by Bob Rieff the minutes were unanimously approved.

TREASURER'S REPORT- Expenses exceeded income by \$5,000.

After a motion by Don Freeman and a second by Steve Daniels the Treasurer's report was unanimously accepted.

PASTOR'S REPORT – The Search committee is a good group sharing openly and honestly where they are. Pastor Kuhn was at the Penn Central Conference this past weekend. Bev Moran attended as a delegate. A survey at the 9:15 service indicated that Order of Worship, Time for Silent Prayer, and Developing Relationships are Very Important.

COMMISSION REPORTS

OUTREACH - Julie B. Food Bank - At this time monetary support is the best way to support the Food Bank .

PARISH LIFE - Clara K. Parish Life is looking into charging perhaps \$50 for funeral receptions for paper supplies, coffee, etc. Clara will take this to the next MPC meeting for more discussion.

Parish Life is working on rewriting the Kitchen Use policy. They will work with Property Commission on this.

PROPERTY Herb F. Direct Energy will supply the electricity at 7.9 cents a kilowatt. The price is guaranteed for two years. The Youth Center will use American Gas at 7.49 cents a kilowatt. This price is guaranteed for one year.

WORSHIP-Bernie F. – Redesigning pew cards, working on getting Worship Stewards. Worship is considering having a brochure available for Academy Parents.

OLD BUSINESS

40th Anniversary – so far \$3,041 has been donated for the Food Hub. (Our goal is at least \$10,000.)

Kitchen Licensing - Andy has been in contact with Ms. Moseby and will take the information to Gary Brown and then MPC.

POLICY MANUAL 307 General Operating Fund Expenditures- After much discussion it was decided to return the document to Stewardship to clarify the term "statements" on line 7 of topic 3. This has to do with which bills can be paid with a single signature.

NEW BUSINESS

Nomination Committee – Five are needed from council: Cathy Kenlin (chair), Steve Daniels, Herb Forry, and Bob Rieff have volunteered so far. Council supplied Andy with suggestions of names of members from the congregation as five members are needed for the Nomination Committee.

APOSTLES ACADEMY - Andy will meet with Abe Breslin and Andy Smith to bring the Academy into the church and under a commission.

Ministries Opportunities Guide was passed out and reviewed for any corrections.



CORRECTION TO TYPING OF 2013 BY-LAWS

The paragraph related to Term Limits was inadvertently omitted. The 2007 By-Laws stated:

A. Membership - The Council shall consist of 21 full members, who shall be elected by the Congregation.

1. Members of the Council shall serve a term of three years and shall be eligible for re-election to the Council. After two consecutive terms, a one-year period must elapse before a person is eligible for re-election.

The 11/18/13 revision to the By-Laws stated:

A. Membership – The Council shall consist of 15 members who shall be elected by the Congregation.

1. The By-Laws dealing with term limits will be suspended for the year 2011 and any member wishing to remain on council for one additional year may do so. THE ERROR WAS THAT THE WORDING OF 2007 STATING MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL SHALL SERVE A TERM OF THREE YEARS was not included in the final typing.

COUNCIL AGREED THE BY-LAWS SHOULD BE RETYPED WITH THIS OMISSION ADDED.

After a Closing Prayer the meeting adjourned at 9:20.

On June 14th and 18th, the Associate Pastor Search Committee hosted congregational forums. At each forum, the UCC process of Search and Call was reviewed. Tom Lewis, Search Committee Chair, gave an update on COA's progress with this process. Dave Miron, facilitator from the Samaritan Center, led the rest of the forum focusing on the congregation's feelings and questions about the search process, as well as identifying ways God's work is visible at Church of the Apostles.

The Search Committee appreciates the Congregation's support as the Search and Call process continues. One concern shared was around the speed of the process and concern for finding the right person. It is good to remember that the process has changed with the use of technology, so profiles are received more quickly and are able to be shared electronically to be read prior to a meeting. This has increased our efficiency greatly. The committee is also committed to finding the RIGHT candidate, not just the best of undesirable candidates. We also feel that we are in conversation with quality applicants. The ideas and suggestions shared at the forum are being considered by the committee. Continue to listen for regular updates from the Search Committee during weekly worship and in future issues of The Crown. Your prayers for the search process and COA's future associate pastor are appreciated.

By-Laws Correction

- Andrew H. Appel, Council President

It was recently discovered that in the revisions of our By-Laws over the last several years, two sentences had been omitted by error. However, despite the omission, Council has been following the [missing] wording regarding term limits of Council members. The last time the sentences noted below appeared in the By-Laws was — to our knowledge — in 2007. Returning this information to the By-Laws does not change any intent, nor constitute any amendment — it is the correction of an error by omission.

The sentences that were omitted are:

"Members of the Council shall serve a term of three (3) years and shall be eligible for re-election to the Council. After two (2) consecutive terms, a one (1) year period must elapse before a person is eligible for re-election."

The above should be added to your copy of the By-Laws in Article III [Council], A. [Membership], [new#] 2. Copies of our current By-Laws will be printed with the correction, and may be picked up at the Church office.

Lancaster British Brass Band

On Thursday, August 6 at 7:00 p.m. Crown Concert Series is pleased to bring back the Lancaster British Brass Band, consisting of 28 players including three percussionists, under the direction of conductor Dr. Stephen Allen.

The Lancaster British Brass Band was founded in 2004 by Paul Belser, Walter Blackburn, and Rick Staherski — three well-known Lancaster, Pennsylvania musicians. It draws its personnel from the four-state region of Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware, and New Jersey.

Originally conceived as a top-level, professional-quality ensemble, it includes among its membership professional solo and ensemble players and music teacher/performers.

For concert programs, brass bands borrow from virtually every musical genre. A typical program consists of transcriptions of the classics, marches, hymns, popular music arrangements, solos, and original compositions written for the medium.

The unique sound quality of the Lancaster Brass Band is due to its being composed entirely of brass winds and percussion instruments. The sound of the Lancaster British Brass Band has been compared to "one big, magnificent pipe organ."
