From the Pastor...

Our worship focus this summer is to continue to build God's kingdom by looking at the ways in which we connect with one another. Many times, I hear people celebrate our Outreach projects as times when we are meeting the needs of others and getting to know each other by working together. For those who are only able to come to worship, this is more difficult. So our worship themes are centered on our senses and how we experience stories. Each week, we will explore the scripture through our physical, intellectual, and emotional senses.

In the pews, we will have prayer books where a prayer, uplifting thought, or greeting may be written for the next person who sits in that seat to read, creating a "Pew Pal" in the form of a Pen Pal. We are also looking for volunteers to share a bit of their story in which they have experienced the presence of God. These stories will be taped ahead of time and shown as a video in the services. It is our hope that those who are uncomfortable getting up in front of everyone will also share their stories.

For the children, we will have a stuffed animal in the shape of a Red Tail Hawk hidden each week for them to find with a message addressed to them. We chose the Red Tail Hawk because two have chosen our steeple as a place to sit and watch the neighborhood. In Native-American culture, the presence of a Red Tail Hawk suggests that one is to be aware of and work toward fulfilling the soul's destiny. It also indicates a strong presence of the Holy Spirit. With its broader vision, it encourages the prophetic insight of humanity. This ties in nicely with the theme of the children's Sunday school class on creation, and with our continued effort to refine the vision of our congregation.

We hope you will join us frequently in worship!

Andy's Meanderings

DNA

DNA is the molecular basis for heredity. In humans, the DNA of the father and the mother are combined in the next generation.



Is such so different in a church? Our church?

Church of the Apostles has two distinct "groups" that I'll call "the 9:15s" and the "10:45s." Those on the younger end of the scale are generally seen at 9:15 (I'm including young at heart in this group!). The more "seasoned" (I among you) are seen at 10:45. We have our "mixer" between services. While this time is way too short sometimes, at least there is contact between the groups and discussion occurs as well. On the occasion of special events, there is little distinction between groups as all are working hard toward event goals.

But what is being contributed by each group for the future? What DNA is being combined?

Apostles, on one hand, is not very different than almost any congregation anywhere: each "group" tends to stay among themselves for most participation. This is all well and good, and creates a positive result for the purpose of

the activity, thus the church. That involvement is pretty much the norm in churches today.

But what about planning for the future? As much as we "seasoned" members may have comfort in doing things "as we always did," I'm afraid we might be missing something with that approach. We need to look forward, to plan, and to dream for Apostles. And, even with that approach, we have to share our "10:45s" DNA, thoughts, and hopes with the "9:15s" DNA, thoughts, and hopes. As in the secular world, DNA needs to be *combined* for the next generation...and the next...and the next.

As any plan for Apostles' future is considered, there is a responsibility to combine the DNA of the entire congregation in those ideas. Making the most of each group's DNA assures the brightest and best hope for the future.

May it be so.....

Giving Report for April 2016

April was not our best month. Our income was practically the same as it was for April last year, but our expenses were more than \$24,000 higher than a year ago. The actual numbers are: \$153,921 income for April 2016 and \$154,411 income for April of last year. Our expenses for this April were \$189,521, but only \$165,381 for last April. So our loss at this point in the year is \$36,600.

Every year, we move 5% of the earnings and interest from our endowments into our general fund checking account. The Stewardship Commission agreed that now would be the right time to move that money, so the totals at the end of the second quarter next month will look considerably better.

The meeting was called to order at 7:05 by Bob Reiff. He welcomed new Council member Conner Braun, who will be installed at this Sunday's service.

Devotions were presented by Carol Nielsen, based on the Daily Devotional on "Showing Up."

Minutes from the March 21, 2016 Council meeting were approved as presented. (J. Berkow, C. Kosmela)

Treasurer's Report - no report

Flo Waldron, representing the Education Commission, presented a slide show on Safe Church guidelines, and noted that we must be sure that our policy aligns with Pennsylvania state laws.

Parish Life

- Clara reported that Jen Eaton will be speaking on May 20 about VisionCorp.
- The Garage Sale brought in \$6,078.
- There is a sign-up sheet in the welcome center for people willing to give rides to members who are unable to get to church.

Worship

- Bernie noted that they are looking for large-print Bibles to have in the sanctuary for persons with vision difficulties; also larger-print bulletins.
- They are also checking out the hearing devices in the sanctuary.

Education

- Linda announced that Apostles Community Preschool will celebrate its 50th Anniversary in church on Sunday with the current children singing at 10:30, and a luncheon at noon.

Stewardship No meeting this month

Property

- Herb reported that all was in the minutes.

Outreach

- Julie reported that all meals for Crispus Attucks are to be made in certified kitchens, and that congregations wishing to serve are encouraged to underwrite the meal for \$200.
- We are already booked to help at Crispus Attucks on the first Sunday of Advent, Nov. 27.
- Eight people have volunteered to take the ServSafe course, at \$65 each.

Pastor Kuhn's Report

- Pastor Kathy clarified that the Safe Church presentation was not a policy at this point, just a recommendation and draft. We are to read the information carefully in order to discuss it later.
- She distributed cards for members to list (1) why do we come to this church; and (2) how do we connect with others.
- She urged all Commissions to work together to go in the same direction; we need to name a vision for the future.

Pastor Giffen's Report

- She is happy to welcome a youth member to the Council (Conner B.)
- Six youth are registered for the National Youth Event in Florida this summer.
- General Synod is in Baltimore next year.
- She is on the planning committee for a Youth Retreat at Hartman Center in the fall.

Old Business

- Bob emphasized the importance of focusing on (1) the Safe Church policy; and (2) getting our kitchen certified.
- Cathy K. noted that there will be training sessions for the new app, The City.
- Discussion was held on liability insurance and who needs it.
- The students from F&M working on the worship questionnaire went to Grace Baptist Church across the street on Sunday instead of COA. They should be at our church

Seeds of Hope Early Season



It’s not news to anyone reading this that this spring has offered challenges to gardening because of all the rain. Small home gardens haven’t fared too poorly because most planting is done by hand; but in a garden the size of Seeds of Hope, some of the planting is done by tractor and that puts us in the situation of not being able to plant until the ground has dried enough to run the tractor through it. That doesn’t happen very well when it rains six days out of seven. That is the long way to say that we’re behind already. It is May 16th right now, and we still have a number of vegetables to get into the ground. At the same time, we know we’re going to be praying for rain once the heat settles in for the summer.

Gardening is back-breaking work in sometimes poor conditions (think mud). But those of us who are addicted to it can’t wait for it to start every year.



A number of you have been enjoying our top-notch asparagus for the first time this spring. We planted 100 asparagus plants three years ago, and this year they were finally ready to be picked. It was worth the wait! The berries are coming on strong too, and we all know that fresh-picked raspberries and blackberries are always worth the wait.



We will be planting 77 tomato plants this week, so we think we'll have enough of them to satisfy everyone's appetite later in the summer. Tomatoes, corn, and new potatoes are what mean summer to a lot of people, and we think you will all be pleased when you can get all you want of them.

Something new will be added to the shed this year on Tuesdays and Fridays when we sell the vegetables. People have not been comfortable with the produce being sold by donation. From the beginning, they've asked us to price the produce. This summer, we will try that and see if it makes our customers more comfortable shopping with us that way. The community customers who purchase their produce from us have been consistently generous in their donations to us. That allows us to donate vegetables to hungry people all summer. Please consider making a donation to the Seeds of Hope garden so hungry people can eat fresh healthy produce this summer.

June is Lancaster Seminary Month

Last year, when I wrote this article, I gave you a short history of the Lancaster Theological Seminary. A seminary of which, I feel, we can be proud.

Today, I want to share some of the experiences I had while attending graduation events over the past weekend. A very excellent article covering the highlights of the Commencement service held here at Church of the Apostles appeared in the Lancaster Newspaper on Sunday, May 15th. It began with a very liturgical service in Santee Chapel where Rev. Dr. Monica Dawkins-Smith delivered a challenging message titled "Interdependence: Sharing Possessions in Common," based on the scripture reading from Acts 2:14-47 and the Gospel of Luke 19:1-10.

The climax of the event took place in the Sanctuary of Church of the Apostles, where about 500 people came to celebrate with the graduating class of 2016 and to receive the message from Rev. Dr. Tony Campolo, Professor

Emeritus, of Eastern University. Basing his message on the scripture reading from Ephesians 4:1-12, the title of his message was "A Church for the 21st Century". A very challenging, thought provoking, and humorous message that kept us all alert.

I bring these thoughts to you because this is the month we focus our attention on our relationship with the Seminary. Twenty-eight men and women, receiving differing diplomas, are being sent out to carry out the mission and fulfill the message from Jesus to preach, teach, and live it in their lives.

It is our challenge to assist these students, and those who follow, to have a less burdensome weight upon their shoulders in financing their missions. We have been doing this for many years, and our church has received the benefits of the Seminary graduates who have come to serve our congregation.

So, again, I ask you to take the offering envelope from your box, and prayerfully consider what your gift might be toward this mission.

May the Creative and still Creating Force around you and within you bless you in your giving.




