

Dear Friends.

We are at a very unique place in our history with a full staff of talented people to help the church minister in a larger way to our community and grow. As you received your budgets, you could tell that we are putting additional funding into staffing to thank those who have been here and to attract the quality people we have brought on to join them.

I often hear two very different messages within the congregation. One is a message of concern about the level of deficit spending for which the church prepares each year. Although we have done this for some time, our investments continue to grow and we have not been adversely affected. In addition, it is important to remember that the church's financial situation cannot be compared to an individual or family's plan because the church is never meant to retire. Rather we are called to faithfully use our resources to be "Sharing Christ's Love with All People" as our current vision states. This means we are to be meeting people where they are and offering them love and care that is not found elsewhere, particularly right now. Our congregation continues to answer the call to be ones who want to make a difference in our community.

Another message I hear is that we will run out of people before we run out of money. This is a valid concern and is why it is time to spend some money on staffing to see how the additional staffing may positively influence our message and connections to the community. If the money was meant for a "rainy day," it is raining and the Spirit is calling us to find new and inventive ways to do ministry. Our online presence has helped us reach people who would not walk into our building without knowing what message they will hear inside. This is the time when we are called to reach out to the millennials who have not looked at church before but want somewhere to find hope. It is time to reach out to those who were told they were not worthy of being part of other churches.

Please prayerfully consider how we will move forward together!

From the Associate Pastor

Reflecting on Ministry in the Covid Era:

What is to be celebrated? What have we yet to consider?

Before Covid, about 85% of churches were in decline, 94% were not keeping up the population growth rate. The worship, activities and mission efforts of most churches were not reaching new people in our communities. In some areas of the country, only 10% of people were worshipping anywhere.

Then March came and Covid hit. I want to applaud the efforts of so many pastors and lay people who have made some quantum leaps in getting their churches online for worship, study groups and other gatherings. The technology learning curve has been steep and many of you are tired or exhausted from that transition.

But now that you have made that leap, I want to ask a hard question. What has really changed in your ministry? What I see in many churches is that what was being done in person has simply been transported online. The worship and programs that were not connecting with new people pre-Covid, are the same things now appearing on websites, Facebook, etc. In many cases, all the effort is still going to those who are already members and believers. The number of churches in decline has not changed since March.

But what about all those folk in our communities who don't have a faith experience or know of the value of being part of a church? I believe the next phase of change/adaptation is to do a deep-dive into the needs of the next group in your community that you want to reach. Out of that research, can we then really begin to change how we worship, what groups we offer and what mission efforts we make, based on their needs and not just our own? Such change is going to require lots of prayer and a willingness to try new things, some of which will work and some that will not. This work is not easy, but we can learn how to really connect with our mission field and make new disciples; something that wasn't happening in most churches Pre-Covid.

You have done a great job of moving into 21st Century technology. Will you now adapt that technology to connect with people who are currently far away from your church?

Saturday Morning Breakfast

11/4

While it is not a hot meal, the Saturday Breakfast ministry is back in a modified form serving the food insecure in Lancaster. On October 3rd, 4 volunteers handed out "breakfasts to go" to 40 guests at First Reformed church. Set up outside and wearing masks and gloves, bagged breakfasts of cereal, milk, juice, snack, and fresh fruit were distributed. While not ideal, this looks like the format we will be using for the months to come. It felt wonderful to be serving others again.

Power Packs Project

Founded in 2004, the Power Packs Project was created to ensure that low-income children are well fed over the weekend and ready to learn at school on Monday. They serve 45 schools in 13 school districts in Lancaster and 3 school districts in Lebanon. With 500 volunteers this organization serves over 1600 families. Church of the Apostles has supported Power Packs since 2007 and we have partnered with Elizabeth Martin School for the last ten years.

Power Packs has a different format this fall. This year to abide by covid protocols, each Wednesday volunteers pick up pre-boxed "packs" of healthy food at the warehouse for each family and deliver them to Martin School. School staff then distribute to the families later in the day. Demand for Power Packs at Martin has increased since Covid jumping from 24 families last year to 36 families being served this year⁵

A Musical Note "Music isn't just a pleasure, a transient satisfaction. It's a need, a deep hunger; and when the music is right, it's joy. Love. A foretaste of heaven. A comfort in grief. Is it too much to think that perhaps God speaks to us sometimes through music?

How, then, could I be so ungrateful as to refuse the message?" - Orson Scott Card I fell in love with Orson Scott Card's quote when I first read it. He captures a sentiment which I've always felt to be true: there is music for every season in life. I don't think I'm alone in this sentiment, as Card's quote is featured on quite a few quotable quote websites pertaining to music. But what about the second part of the quote? That part doesn't have that feel good sentiment that is in the first part. Have I at times allowed an ungrateful attitude to skew my view of music or the message in a work of art? As much as I don't want to admit it, it most certainly has. I believe that God speaks to us through music in many ways. What message are we to hear? I hold the belief that music, or any great work of art for that matter, can offer the individual or individuals experiencing the work a variety of insights and experiences. That's what separates great music from music that is merely pleasurable and transient; it allows us to arrive at a variety of observations and perspectives.

Great music can even lead us to a change in vantage point about the work overtime. I have experienced this as someone that both creates and experiences music as a listener. On a first listening, I may not be receptive to the message present. I may even dislike what I'm experiencing. But through repeated listening and time, I may be able to experience the message in the work more fully and relate to it on a more personal level. Sometimes pieces that I intensely dislike on a first hearing can become a favorite for me over time and with repeated listening. So how can we hear and embrace the message which is present in music when we are ungrateful and closed off? By listening as we do in prayer: with an open heart, mind, and spirit. God has the power to open doors in our lives. Are we able to truly listen and receive this wonderful gift of God's spirit instead of shutting it out? I would like to invite you to some performances during the month of November that COA is hosting:

November 7th at 3pm: Nathan Sheffer, Ron Bellamy, and I will present an online concert. This concert will be accessible through the church's website and other media pages and will remain online after 3pm if you are unable to attend at that time.

November 21st, Bill Hager: will present a dramatic multimedia story for families with young children in the sanctuary at 7pm entitled "*The Nanny in the Manor House*." Mr. Hager tells the Mary Poppins story with a twist; the children have all grown up. After he tells the story, he will give a talk about what went into the creation of this story and will give the audience a behind the scenes look at his creative process. I hope that you are able to join the Apostles' community for these performances. May God's love fill you with peace, joy, and an open heart and ears!

Festival of Christmas

Advent Wreath Stations:

This year during Advent we will be placing each of the four Advent candles at a separate station in the sanctuary. Each station we will then have a letter from a Christmas story character telling how they have hope through Jesus' birth. The Christ candle will be on the Communion table with the manger for people to write their own story of hope because of Jesus. By doing all the stations, families will be able to create a Christmas ball of items symbolizing each of the stations. The Advent stations will be available to the congregation and community by registration on December 20, 21, 22, 23, and 27th from 5:30-7:30 PM with prerecorded music and on Christmas Eve from 6:00-6:50 with live music.
