INTRODUCING THE SPEAKERS

SUSAN HOSTETTER is the President of The Mt Gretna Area Historical Society. She serves on the Chautauqua Board of Managers as Chair of its Summer Programs and Website committees and a trustee and secretary of the PA Chautauqua Foundation.

Dr. Lee Barrett has taught at Lancaster Seminary since September 1993. Prior to this, Lee taught theology at the Presbyterian School of Christian Education in Richmond, Virginia. Lee's interests include the relationship between the doctrinal traditions of the Christian churches and contemporary culture.

Jay Good has had a passion for growing house plants since he was nine years old when his great-aunt taught him to grow African violets. He has been employed in the Garden Department of Stauffers of Kissel Hill for 26 years.

The Rev. Dr. Jonette Gay has been a pastor since 1992 and currently serves as the pastor of Otterbein United Methodist Church in Lancaster. She previously served churches in Texas, New Mexico, and Pennsylvania. She has a passion for both contemplation and action when it comes to a living faith.

Dr. Steve Nolt is professor of history and Anabaptist Studies at Elizabethtown College and director of the college's Young Center for Anabaptist and Pietist Studies. He holds a Ph.D. in history from the University of Notre Dame. He has authored or coauthored fifteen books on Amish, Mennonite, and Pennsylvania German History and contemporary life.

Dr. Abby Schrader has been a professor of Russian and Soviet history at Franklin and Marshall College for 25 years and is currently department chair. She studied and conducted research in the Soviet Union and Russia from 1985 through the late 2000s. She has taught a course titled, "Making Sense of Putin's Russia" for the past decade.

Amanda Hickle is the VP of Development and Communications at Lancaster Farmland Trust. She has served in the non-profit field for 19 years, 15 of which she has devoted to developing, implementing and managing fundraising and communications strategies.

Francine Black is the Artistic Director Emeritus and cofounder of Berks Opera Company. She is a professional singer, pianist, linguist, conductor and composer. Most recently she has served as principal conductor for Berks Opera Company.
