Pastor's Corner

"I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?"

As Christians we know the rhythm of the season. We begin Lent with the reminder that we are dust and to dust we will return. Then for forty days we wait for Easter. For some the waiting is deepened through a practice of spiritual disciplines meant to draw one closer to God, to Jesus, or to the Spirit who continually surrounds us. For others, it is simply a time of waiting. No matter one's approach to the season, the destination is still the same – Easter.

But what are we truly waiting for in Easter? For most of my childhood what I was waiting for was a grand and glorious day of celebration. I knew there would be fresh live flowers in the sanctuary, the music would be loud and boisterous, the congregation would swell like only seen at Christmas, and when I returned home there would be delicious food, time with family, and candy. Yet as I have aged, I have found myself poking and prodding for the more. Certainly, Jesus' death and God's resurrection of him from the dead has greater meaning and power than this. What are we waiting for in Easter?

In John's Gospel, before Jesus begins the journey of holy week, he encounters a weeping and distraught Martha. Her brother, whom she loved and whom undoubtedly provided critical support to this family, has died. Her world is turned upside down as she is now surrounded by loss and unknown uncertainty for her future. In this place of grief, anxiety, and despair, Jesus asks her a life-defining question, "Do you believe that I am the resurrection and the life, and that in me there is life even in death?"

It has been said that the only way to Easter Sunday is through Good Friday. The only way to enter into the life of Christ is to first enter into his death. For me, the forty days of Lent are not about getting me to Easter. They are about getting me to Good Friday. I have no power to "make" Easter happen. Easter is God's work. Even Jesus doesn't "make" Easter happen. All that I can do is the same thing Jesus did - get myself to Good Friday. All I can do is struggle and to strive to hand my life over to God, praying the prayer of Christ "not my will, but thy will be done." And through this prayer risk myself to the hope that even though I die (in whatever way God is calling me to enter into death), I will live...I will be raised to new life that will be a blessing not only for me, but for others as well.

Our calling as Christians is not simply to remember the death of Jesus and to celebrate God's resurrection of him. Our calling is to openly enter into this faith ourselves. In this we wait for Easter – God's work of true and abiding life to be made real in this world and in our lives – as we give ourselves over to God in lived Good Fridays.

To live resurrection faith is to believe far more in God's good and glorious life than in the power of death, as we pick up our cross and follow our savior. Do you believe this?

Consultant Investigation Team Has Formed

Inspired by the January 23rd congregational meeting presentation and subsequent “5 Practices of Fruitful Congregations” discussions, a diverse team has formed to begin the initial work of reviewing and identifying potential consultants to work with our congregation.

The goal of the team is to spend the next 3-6 months evaluating consultants based upon the objectives set out in the January 23rd presentation. These objectives include:

- Provide a mechanism for re-discerning a congregationally owned vision, mission, and purpose
- Facilitate the transition of our primary focus to the community Christ has called us to serve
- Provide learning & methods for healthy conflict resolution
- Intentionally build connectivity within the congregation
- Evaluate our organizational structure

The team will present their recommendation(s) to Council for further reflection on needed skill sets, alignment of objectives, and appropriate cultural fit. A process will then be developed to present the potential consultant to the congregation for evaluation and vote.

A MUSICAL NOTE WITH LARS POTTEIGER

Setting A Tone for Lent, Holy Week, and Easter

What sounds do you think of when you think about the music for Lent, Holy Week, and Easter? How does the music we make in worship set a tone for these seasons of the church year? I have always found Lent to be a time of inward reflection. Music helps me to achieve this more contemplative mindset, whether I am actively performing it or passively experiencing it as a listener.

The music for Lent, Holy Week, and Easter gives us a great contrast in both text and overall musical tone. Hymns during Lent tend to gravitate more towards a minor mode, which is a darker, more sorrowful sound. Hymns at this time of the church year also move in a slower tempo than they might other seasons. Easter is a celebration, and the music reflects this festive mood in a variety of ways. Hymns move a little quicker and are more commonly written in a major mode, which is a brighter, more joyous sound. The text of hymns during this time of the church year range from those Lenten hymns that call for deep reflection and discernment to the joyous hymns of Easter, which help us celebrate the joys of the resurrection. One activity I like to do when I work with singers is to encourage them to approach the text of a hymn more like a prayer and less like a hymn text. How could approaching hymn singing like this change our intention in worship with how we engage in group singing?

Holy Week is the time that helps us transition from Lent into Easter. The music at this time can be very varied in worship, ranging from the shouts of "Hosanna" on Palm Sunday, to lamentations at the cross and grave later in the week. Holy Week acts as a bridge from Lent to Easter, and allows us to come full circle in our Lenten journey. How has your Lenten journey shaped your faith this season?

Church of the Apostles Establishes A Pharmacy in Honduras

With accumulated funds designated for use by Central American Relief Efforts [C.A.R.E.], COA had provided seed money to establish the 31st local pharmacy in southwestern Honduras, in the same area where COA funded a new school several years ago.

As there are very few pharmacies even in towns, C.A.R.E. funded pharmacies provide a steady supply of basic pharmaceuticals for the impoverished living in the countryside who would otherwise have to make an extraordinary effort to obtain medications.

C.A.R.E. coordinates with village mayors to choose a responsible villager as "the pharmacist". Seed money [about \$2,500.00, provided by C.A.R.E. donation, purchases the medications, shelving and related storage and bookkeeping materials. C.A.R.E., with the aid of a registered Honduran pharmacist, has prepared a 'user manual' which covers the entire process of providing a steady, reliable flow of medications. No prescriptions are filled: in many cases, something as simple as aspirin is the appropriate treatment. The 'pharmacist' keeps the records, inventory, and coordinates with C.A.R.E.'s Honduran members with reorders, questions and advice. The 'pharmacist' 'earns' a percentage of the gross profit, with the remainder used to maintain the medical inventory.

C.A.R.E. again thanks Church of the Apostles for your caring.

Market Basket (Grocery Cards)

Do you shop at **Stauffers**, **Giant** or **Weis** markets? Are you willing to earn 5% cashback for our church just by purchasing your usual groceries? At absolutely no cost to you! We hope so! That's why our sale of grocery cards here at COA continues undaunted while covid safety precautions continue.

On the **first and second Sundays** of each month, you may order (with payment by cash, check or Realm) Stauffers (\$50), Giant (\$50), or Weis (\$50) Grocery Cards. *Some cards may be available for immediate purchase and use.* Purchased cards are useable the same as cash at the appropriate grocery stores. The benefit is that the church gets a 5% return from our bulk purchases of cards. These additional funds are then used to support our Outreach programs.

There are a couple of ways to purchase grocery cards currently:

1. You may order cards (with payment at time of order) OR (to be paid for upon receipt) to be picked up on the first two Sundays of the following month. **You may now pay via the Realm site** (*plus courtesy fee*). Cards may be ordered **in the Narthex** on the 1st and 2nd Sundays of the month, following each worship service. Simply complete an available order form, attach your payment (check payable to COA with Market Basket on the memo line), Realm or cash, and give it to the person at the table.
2. You may order cards for immediate purchase and pickup (we often, but not always, have some extra cards beyond the number that have been pre-ordered) by phoning Karen Helmeczi (717-299-2972) or emailing to kjhelmeczi@gmail.com. Arrangements can be made to pick up and pay for these cards (check to COA as above or cash) on Sunday mornings or other convenient times or at the Helmeczi residence in Homestead Village (1832 Westcott Drive) very near the church or other negotiated location.
