I want to continue our single-service Sundays experiment every Sunday.

o Strongly agree 48
o Agree 16
o I have no opinion 11
o Disagree 12
o Strongly disagree 8
o Abstained 5

So, the decisions became when and how do we make the service blended to the best of our ability. Our staff, Worship Commission and Council have given input into these decisions and our best wisdom is that we will have a single service on May 7, then on Sunday, June 4th we will begin with a new well-designed blended service. This is allowing us time to find new musicians as two of the musicians who play in our 9 AM band are not able to continue with us. The music staff is working on this right now and the band will be playing at the June 4th service, as well as having traditional organ music. And for the summer, we will continue with the 10 AM time frame.

For those who want something earlier, we will be offering Compassion Camp in Rader Park each Sunday at 9 AM for the summer. Compassion Camp will include opening devotions, Bible lessons, children's activities, adult discussions, crafts and opportunities to be together to learn about God in our beautiful outdoor space.

I know this adds change to our lives. Change can be scary, but for first the first time in my ministry with you, we have a clear decision and are moving with it. As we build the worship services for the next few months, we will be looking to create experiences that give you goose bumps, laugh and cry all in the same service. You are our best form of advertising, so please invite others to join us!

A Message from the Executive Committee

When we first installed the screens and began displaying the liturgy and songs on the screens, there were people in the congregation who really didn't like it. But a few months ago, when our A/V system was damaged by a power surge and we were without the projectors and screens for many weeks, there was a strong desire to return to what is now the status quo.

The survey results indicate a clear preference for the congregation to move to a single worship service on Sunday mornings. A common theme about our two services in the past was that we were two different congregations. The 11 AM service folks didn't know the 9 AM folks and vice versa. There was also a belief that the two services were vastly different. Over the years, we have experimented occasionally with the time and frequency of our services. We shifted the times to try and incorporate a Sunday School time between the services. Some years, we went to one service in the summer. And of course, the pandemic changed how we came together for over a year. Some of those changes have carried into today, as over 10% of our weekly attendance is now online and not in person.

There was a desire, then and particularly now, to gather together in one service each Sunday. There are many reasons for this, some internally focused and some externally focused. As we have been discussing this possibility, our goal as leadership was to make this decision in a thoughtful and informed manner with the support of Council and the Congregation.

We say that we worship so that we can praise and experience our God; to hear the message of God's teachings and God's truth; and to come together as God's people to share in our joys and our struggles. But in reality, worship is a very personal experience. The music that stirs my heart may not be the music that you grew up with in your worship experience. One person may prefer the officiant to wear formal robes with a more traditional service while another prefers a more contemporary service. Parents need to feel comfortable coming to a single service knowing that their younger children may not be able to sit quietly during the service and that that is ok. Someone visiting our church for the first time may never have experienced a worship service before and everything will be brand new to them.

As we move into having a combined service, we need to be able to offer ourselves and our worship leaders grace. There will be too much organ and there will not be enough organ. There will be too much formality and there will be too much casualness. There will be too many hymns and there will be too many drums. We will need to change our schedules to accommodate the time change. For those not used to children in the service, we will need to welcome our children into our worship space and enjoy their sounds of play and sometimes the sound of their frustration that they can't do what they want. We may need to find another seat or another pew if our usual seat is filled by someone else.

But just as we came to embrace the screens, we can move forward into embracing a single service and creating a new worship style at Church of the Apostles. The congregation has identified many benefits of making this move. And just as with any change, we will need to make adjustments and experiment with new approaches giving ourselves grace in the choices we make.

A Musical Note

Modern worship can take many forms. Traditional services make use of hymn singing and organ music. Contemporary services utilize praise bands and popular music. Many churches opt for "blended woship" by combining elements of the aforementioned types of services. But what exactly does blended worship entail?

Blended worship is a unique expression of the faith and life of a church and is a rich blending of traditional and modern elements, allowing the congregation to connect with God and one another. This approach is not a "one size fits all" approach to worship. Music can be shared in a service through more traditional elements like organ and choir-led singing occurring in the same service with a praise band and solo singers. Another possible way to blend musical elements in a service is to reimagine older hymns for a more modern type of ensemble like a band. One could even have the choir sing contemporary praise choruses with or without a band. There are many other unique and creative ways a church can use blended worship to revitalize and enliven music within a service. But why blend worship?

Blended worship allows us to more fully experience the musical gifts of the Holy Spirit, gifts from both the past and the present. There is a rich musical tradition upon which our faith is built that inspires hearts and minds. There are also creative individuals finding unique ways to express their faith through song and music using more modern sounds. We are stronger as a community and can grow in love and fellowship when we lift our voices in song together. Regardless of the age or time period of a given piece of music, God's voice is still speaking - may we have the ears to hear it.
